



This summer, Argo will begin construction of the new Fine Arts Center. After years of countless plays, concerts, academic competitions, and various events, the old theatre – the Bulow Auditorium - will be no more. In the new fine arts building, there will be a whole new auditorium, choir room, band room, theatre/ensemble room, and numerous practice rooms for the band and orchestra. The fine arts center will also have dressing rooms and a lobby. This building will be placed on the tennis court outside the Industrial Tech

wing, and will have a walkway from the science wing to the new building. Besides the Fine Arts Center, the old auditorium, choir and band & orchestra room will have new – yet to be determined – uses. There is no news on whether the tennis court closer to Weldbend will be updated since the existing, northern, one will be removed. Regarding the new building, Mr. Mamminga said, “Argo’s school board, Dr. O’Mara, the architects, and the whole Argo team did a wonderful job putting this fantastic project together. FAFSA FAQ

*Thank you to Ms. Sanchez in the counselor's office for answering these questions.

1. What is FAFSA? and who would benefit from it?

FAFSA stands for the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. FAFSA is an online form that high school seniors submit in order to see if they qualify for government funding for their post-secondary education. The application generates an expected family contribution based on a family's financial need, this will determine if a student qualifies for grants and federal student loans. It gives students access to the largest source of financial aid to pay for college or career school. In addition, many states and colleges use your FAFSA data to determine your eligibility for state and school aid. ALL QUALIFYING high school seniors that are considering attending a post-secondary institution should apply for FAFSA.

2. Do you apply for it? Where can someone find an application?

Yes, you do apply for FAFSA on fafsa.ed.gov using your parents' income tax information and if you have worked you will also need to gather your income tax information.

3. Where can a student go for help on applying?

The guidance department is currently hosting student workshops during lunch and study hall periods in the LRC. You can also see Ms. Sanchez and Ms. Bergman if you have any questions.

4. Are there certain requirements to meet before applying?

Students that are United States Citizens or eligible non-US Citizens can fill out the application. DACA recipients and Dreamers do not qualify for government funding for college, but can apply for private scholarships.

5. When someone does apply when will they know if they got approved?

Students will receive a confirmation page once they submit the FAFSA application. On many occasions you will see if you qualify for the MAP or Pell grant on the confirmation page. During the months of March and April, once the FAFSA has been completed and updated students will receive a Financial Aid Award letter from the colleges that a student has been accepted, this will list any government need-based grants or federal student loans. It will also list any merit aid the student has qualified for due to academic performance.

6. Is there a deadline to apply? If so when?

This year the application was open January 1st, we strongly encourage students to submit their application early because the MAP grant runs out fairly quickly. Last year, the MAP grant was suspended in mid- February.

CollegeSpotlight:

Moraine Valley

Even if you haven't thought much about college, you've definitely heard about Moraine Valley Community College. There

are a lot of people in this community who have been to Moraine, and it's not surprising why. Here are some quick stats about MVCC:

- 17,387 students enrolled
 - One credit hour costs \$116 — compare that to the average U of I rate of \$409 a credit hour
 - Moraine accepts FAFSA money.
 - If you are in the top 10% of your grade, you are eligible for a full-ride scholarship. You can check your ranking on PowerSchool (eg, 25 out of 350 would be eligible, but 45 out of 350 would not.)
 - Moraine also offers other scholarships once you apply.
 - You can apply online for free.
 - Application requirements are simple: you must have a high school certificate or GED and be 18 years old. No one who meets those requirements gets turned away.
 - Moraine offers a good number of basic degrees, such as Business, Chemistry, Psychology, and Criminal Justice.
 - There is an Honors Program for students who have done two of the following: had a 3.2 high school GPA minimum, a composite ACT score of 25, at least a "B" or a 4 in an AP course or exam, or been in the top 10% of high school class.
 - You might already have credits at Moraine! Some industrial technology classes offer dual credit. Ask your teacher for more details.
 - As for athletics, MVCC is a member of the Illinois Skyway Collegiate Conference.
 - About 40 clubs and organizations
 - They are the Cyclones, and their colors are green and white.

Academy Awards 2016 Predictions

We have one of the most complex and confusing years of Oscar nominations on our hands this year. For many of the awards, it seems that there are multiple frontrunners, and the ceremony has been wrapped in criticism for its lack of racial diversity (again) in its nominations. It's been an interesting year. Let's get on with the gargantuan task of predicting the winners of this year's Academy Awards.

Best Picture:

The Nominations: *Spotlight, The Big Short, The Revenant, Mad Max: Fury Road, The Martian, Bridge of Spies, Brooklyn, Room*

This is the most important race, and arguably the most complicated and confusing. There are five potential winners in the category. The big two are *Spotlight*, an early contender, and *The Revenant*, which received considerably less acclaim from critics than the other nominations. I personally consider *Spotlight*, the powerful true-story of journalists tackling the Catholic Church's abuse scandal, the better movie and the more likely win, but *The Revenant* (surprisingly) won Best Drama at the Golden Globes, which gives it quite a push in the odds. Rounding out the likely wins are *The Big Short*, a comedy-drama that is doing well with audiences; *The Martian*, a surprise but mega-successful sci-fi hit that might be able to use its accessibility to win; and *Mad Max: Fury Road*, my personal favorite, a gargantuan, unprecedented romp of apocalyptic, rated-R action and subversive visual storytelling. This is definitely not your average Oscar race.

This race isn't quite as tight. Leonardo very likely has this one in the bag, delivering his stellar performance in *The Revenant*. This year just didn't have any other roles to contest of Leo and his n-Oscar memes. The only possible contender is Michael Fassbender, who is said to have done an excellent job as... well... Jobs. Some say Redmayne might get some points, but after his (frustrating) win last year, I doubt he'll pull an underdog win this late in the race. Matt Damon also has a decent shot, since most of his dialogue was addressed to the audience with little character interaction, which is a difficult task that he achieved with grace.

I'm still a little sour over Charlize Theron not getting nominated for *Furiosa* in *Fury Road*, but that's just me.





Andrew Ochwat's Top 10 Movies of 2015

#10 *The Hunger Games: Mockingjay - Part 2*

Despite the first act of the film following in the downbeat and slow style of the first film, *Mockingjay* overcomes these flaws with jarring themes and surehanded visuals. It is an unflinching work of art and a perfect adaption of the source material. It refuses to conform to norms of its genre, and thus tells an achingly powerful and important story because of that. If our generation is to be defined by any YA franchise, let it be this one.

#9 *Sicario*

Sicario is darkly realistic and entrancing. Both grittily beautiful and subtly thought-provoking, it twists and turns its way into becoming a genuine reflection on our mindset as a society and what's worth given up for safety. It's a film you have to think about for a while, but once you do, you'll realize just how unique and important it is.

#8 *Mission Impossible: Rogue Nation*

While watching this fifth *Mission Impossible* film, it slowly dawned on me that action movies can never truly get old. Sure, there may be some terrible ones, or just boring ones, but it's impossible to run out of ways to excite your audience with brilliant plots, physics-bending fights, and perfectly directed shoot-outs (especially that brilliant one at the Opera). This is the best one of the franchise, and the best spy film in a year full of them.

#7 *The Big Short*

The Big Short, a comedy-drama about the Wall Street Crash of 2008, is propped up with a mix of clever humor and stylish fourth-wall breaking. It is supported by quirky direction a brilliant script that all add up to a brilliant, genuinely important film that knows when to be serious and may just save us from repeating our mistakes. If we're smart enough and pay attention, that is.

#6 *Star Wars: The Force Awakens*

Living up to the hype in nearly every way, *The Force Awakens* is a dazzling work of pop art. While it may have a frustrating reliance on the Original Trilogy, and nearly destroys its relevance to the overall story by having the First Order return with a bigger and better Death Star (again), the wonderful leads and J. J. Abrams' playful direction and gorgeous direction satisfied both skeptics and die-hards alike. When is Episode VIII coming out again?

#5 *Ex Machina*

Here is a film that lingers, that haunts the back of your mind days, weeks, months later. No, it isn't a horror film. More of a science-fiction film. A thriller really. It's about the possibility of taking our blind need as a human species to create until we reach our limit. About the creation of a perfected Artificial Intelligence, it's not so much a cautionary tale as a brilliantly written and shot (and acted) work of "What if?" Or, perhaps even more frighteningly, "When?"

#4 *The Martian*

Following the yearly trend of amazingly-good science-fiction films about space, comes *The Martian*. Ultimately more accessible to the average film-goer than *Interstellar* or *Gravity*, it proves to be an extremely fun and exciting film. It is simply a blockbuster that knows when to be smart and funny, but also when to be tense and serious. And, most of all, to always be extremely likable.

#3 *Spotlight*

In a year full of very important dramas about the real world, the best, and perhaps the most important, is *Spotlight*. It is extremely factual, full of real problems and real people. It is also a deeply emotional, revelatory viewing experience, which infuses its viewers with empathy, anger, and concern. All well justified, too. Hopefully this is one of those movies that serves as a wake up call for the public to realize what's been going on.

#2 *Inside Out*

Pixar is back, and here to stay. After a good number of years with disappointing or small films, *Inside Out* is here. Consistently beautiful, hilarious, and moving, it proves to be one of the smallest Pixar films in scope, but one of the biggest and most successful in ambition. It will delight the younger viewers, entrance the older ones, and provide a warm and important movie for the whole family. This is how to do a kids' movie right.

#1 *Mad Max: Fury Road*

Where did this one come from, right? After 30 years, George Miller revved the Mad Max franchise up and, after ages of development hell, delivered what may very well be the greatest action film of all time. It tore through the box office and even through critics' hearts. *Fury Road* even earned itself a Best Picture nomination (a feat even I thought was impossible). I came out of the movie satisfied on every possible level; no other film this year was as perfect a blend of action, drama, excitement, and art as this one was.
