Feb. 12, 2015, three Muslim students at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill were shot and killed. The murderer, Craig Stephan Hicks, who had previously harassed the family for thier appearance, was charged with three accounts of murder. Police said it was because of a dispute over a parking space, but miht consider it a hate crime. The students were a newlywed couple and the woman's sister. After 9/11 prejudice against Muslims has skyrocketed. Why won't people own up to the fact that no race is perfect and we're all equal.

All lives matter, but it's not white Americans who are losing their lives to hatred. It's time the public is educated on these awful events. Without confrontating the issues we can never take the proper steps to overcome injustice. Stop the hate crimes, stop the stereotype that all Muslims are terrorists, and stop assuming racial superiority. Muslim lives matter, and it's time this country realizes that.

Not some fabricated number.





"Do You Own A Zebra?" One Student's reflections on coming to Argo from Africa

"Do you own a zebra?" "Do you live in houses?" "Do you have smartphones back home?" "Do you ride elephants to school?" "I think it's really cool that you speak English!" No, I don't have a zebra and have never even seen a real one before, but I have seen and touched a harmless crocodile at a reserve - they don't go around walking on the streets; neither do lions, snakes, or elephants. When I first came to Argo from Ghana, West Africa, these were questions I was asked on more than a few occasions.

We love our phones and our technology like any other teenagers, especially considering the fact that majority of the teenagers are sent to boarding school (living on school campus during the semester) for high school. It's not a punishment or military school. It's more our parents' way of trying to make us more responsible, trusting that we can

take care of ourselves under the supervision of our teachers. It is lots of fun because you get to spend so much time with your friends and they become like family; even when you come home during summer break, you miss them. Despite all the fun, there is a lot of academic work that had to be strictly followed and there were consequences for failing classes, like staying in school longer than you should when your friends went home for break.

Detentions would never work in my school and would be everybody's excuse to get out of boarding school chores. We had a disciplinary committee in my school and they take up your case and reprimand you accordingly. Ninety nine percent of public and private school students wear uniforms, there was a certain way you had to keep your hair, no makeup is allowed, and some schools, like mine, even told us which kind of earrings we could wear. The educational system demands hard work and discipline comes first. We didn't even have access to much technology in school, like a laptop cart for almost every class, because Ghana is still a growing country and the economy cannot afford such a luxury. Most of the population in Ghana doesn't have much, but they are a happy and lively people, and growing up around such people teaches you to appreciate even the simple things in life. Air conditioners are not in every class, maybe just the computer labs and school offices. We didn't need heat because we had only one kind of climate - a very hot

one - with Ghana being in the tropics with mountains and seas making it a very beautiful place and a top African tourist attraction. We didn't need three layers of clothes either!

Africans do not talk in clicking sounds, at least not all of them do. Our language is called "Xhosa" and is spoken by people from Southern Africa with different variations; no two languages are the same. In Ghana, we are taught English in school since it was a British colony until only 58 years ago. However, the people in Ghana are divided into ten regions (states) which have tribes of people with their own special African local dialect. Although we do have a democratic government and a president, we still have chiefs amongst our tribes to preserve our culture, like how the British still have a royal family. Most of the time, you know a person's tribe from their tribe name before you even hear them speak their dialect. Ghanaians over the years have gone through great lengths to ensure that the country's culture does not fade away, and most Ghanaian historians fear my generation is going to change that because of our interest the Western world and the things it has to offer, but it makes us able to adapt anywhere we go.

Argo has been a great change. Even though I have only been here for a semester and a half, I have been able to feel like a part of the school with great teachers, the nice students, and the great resources Argo has provided to every student.

Movie Review: Kingsman: The Secret Service by: Andrew Ochwat

At the start of the film, I thought I knew what it was going to be. Not just plot-wise, but the entire thing in general. I imagined an early Bond-type of movie, full of British accents, sarcastic humor, madcap violence, and unbelievable defiance of physics. And as a helicopter whooshed across the screen, firing missiles at an Arabian castle, and as rubble from the explosions bounced across the screen to create the opening titles, all to the sound of Dire Straight's "Money for Nothing," I smiled; I knew I was right.

Not to say that this is all that the film is. Director Matthew Vaughn, of X-Men: First Class, has already proved himself to be a master of weaving emotion into his restless storytelling. While it may not be as powerful as First Class emotionally, it's even more fun.

Shortly after the explosions that make up the film's opening, we meet Eggsy as a young child. His father was an esteemed member of a secret organization. Whataya know, as a troubled teenager, Eggsy runs into a spot of bother (the British must have rubbed off on me), and calls for help. One thing leads to another, and Eggsy begins training as a member of the organization with help from a man who met him as a boy, Galahad (Colin Firth). While Galahad's new-found protege works to be a "Kingsman," Galahad follows the suspicious character, Mr. Valentine (Samuel L. Jackson), who has given a new SIM-card to every member of the human race. The story evolves from there, with Valentine as the Villain, and Eggsy as the Hero, but how it ends isn't important, it's how it's told.

Vaughn references the Bond movie franchise directly during a seemingly pleasant conversation between Valentine and Gallahad, in which Gallahad laments that, "Nowadays, they're all a little serious for my taste. But the old ones... marvelous. Give me a far-fetched theatrical plot any day." This seems to be the vibe of the film: what if Bond movies never got serious? What if they stayed over-the-top and comical? Chances are they would look a lot like this one.

Though it's extremely violent, it isn't taken seriously and therefore isn't disturbing. One of the best scenes in the movie involves a five-minute-long single-shot fighting sequence to "Free Bird." I won't go into details because you'll know it when you see its joyously silly and fun nature.

And while the film is silly and really fun, it knows how to be serious. Plot twists are handled seriously and thoughtfully, the tiniest characters' deaths can be mourned, and even as Valentine's evil plan becomes more and more ridiculous, we can actually understand the sense behind it. And the themes of it – besides obvious criticisms of social media and hurting the environment – are rather unique for an action movie. An emphasis on character


morality is placed throughout, especially the second act, making the characters more likeable as we get to know them.

Aside from being a little overlong, especially in the ending, and having a frustrating over-reliance on countdowns as a plot device, Kingsman: The Secret Service is a ridiculously entertaining thrill-ride. Expect to be moved beyond the action and your popcorn and soda. I can only hope that there are more of these movies, because it would make one doozy of a franchise.
